

Liquidity Disclosures - Basel III

(30th June 2026)

Introduction:

In August 2018, the Central Bank of Bahrain (CBB) issued its regulations on Liquidity Risk Management (LM). Amongst other things, the LM regulations mandated banks to implement Liquidity Coverage Ratio (LCR) by end of June 2019. The main objective of the LCR is to promote short-term resilience of the liquidity risk profile of banks by ensuring that they have sufficient level of High-Quality Liquid Assets (HQLAs) to honor net cash outflows and survive a significant stress scenario lasting for a period of up to 30 days. As per CBB LM regulations, banks must meet the minimum LCR of not less than 100 percent on a daily basis. However, as per CBB circular EDS/NA/01/2026 dated 14 April 2026, the limit was reduced to 80% for a period of 6 months as part of the Liquidity Support Program launched by CBB.

2. As per CBB LM Module, the consolidated LCR of 342.22% reported above in line 23 is the simple average of daily LCR during Q2 2026. Daily average of LCR in Q1 2026 was 302.46%.

Results Analysis and Main Drivers:

BBK has consistently maintained a robust portfolio of HQLAs and diversified funding sources to honor all its obligations on a timely basis. During the second quarter of 2026, the average HQLAs amounted to BD 1,164.4 million. BBK's HQLAs portfolio consists primarily of "Level 1" assets, which represent the highest quality HQLAs, and consists of cash and balances with central banks in jurisdictions where BBK operates, as well as sovereign debt securities in domestic and foreign currencies. In addition, BBK's HQLAs portfolio includes "Level 2" assets which mainly comprises of investment grade corporate bonds.

Cash outflows generally represents demands for liquidity, and payment of contractual funding obligations. During the second quarter of 2026, the cash outflows were mainly driven by non-operational deposits (all counterparties) which accounted for 67.0% of total weighted cash outflows.

The cash inflows mainly represent interest and principal repayment of fully performing money market placements, loans and non-HQLA investment securities funded by BBK. Cash inflows are capped at 75% of total cash outflows.

Introduction:

The CBB's Net Stable Funding Ratio (NSFR) regulations became effective on 31st December 2019. The objective of the NSFR is to promote the resilience of banks' liquidity risk profile and to incentivise a more resilient banking sector over a longer time horizon. The NSFR requires banks to maintain a stable funding profile in relation to assets and off-balance sheet activities. A stable funding structure is intended to reduce the likelihood of disruptions to a bank's regular sources of funding that erodes the liquidity position in a way that would increase the risk of its failure and potentially lead to broader systemic stress. The NSFR limits over-reliance on short-term wholesale funding, encourages better assessment of funding risk across all on-balance sheet and off-balance sheet items, and promotes funding stability. The NSFR must be equal to at least 100% on an ongoing basis. However, as per CBB circular EDS/NA/01/2026 dated 14 April 2026, the limit was reduced to 80% for a period of 6 months as part of the Liquidity Support Program launched by CBB.

Results Analysis and Main Drivers:

BBK's NSFR remained at a very comfortable level during the quarter ended 30th June 2026. As of 30th June 2026, the Available Stable Funding (ASF) stood at BD 3,505.3 million compared to the Required Stable Funding (RSF) of BD 2,616.6 million, resulting in a NSFR of 134.0%.

The main drivers behind the robust ASF are the solid capital base, sizable Retail and Small business deposits portfolio, large portfolio of non-financial institutions deposits (related to Government and Corporate deposits), as well as medium term funding from Borrowings under repurchase agreement, and Term borrowings. The capital base formed 18.4% of the ASF, while the Retail and Small business deposits formed 46.6% of the ASF (after applying the relevant factors).

For the RSF, the primary reason for the relatively low RSF, in comparison to the ASF, is related to the sizeable portfolio of BBK's HQLAs portfolio.

In comparison to year-end December 2025 (NSFR of 131.7%), the NSFR ratio increased by 2.3% due to the decrease in RSF. The decrease in RSF by BD 53.7 million is mainly driven by lower required stable funds for Investment securities due to shorter encumbrance periods, and changes in the portfolio composition towards higher high-quality bonds.
